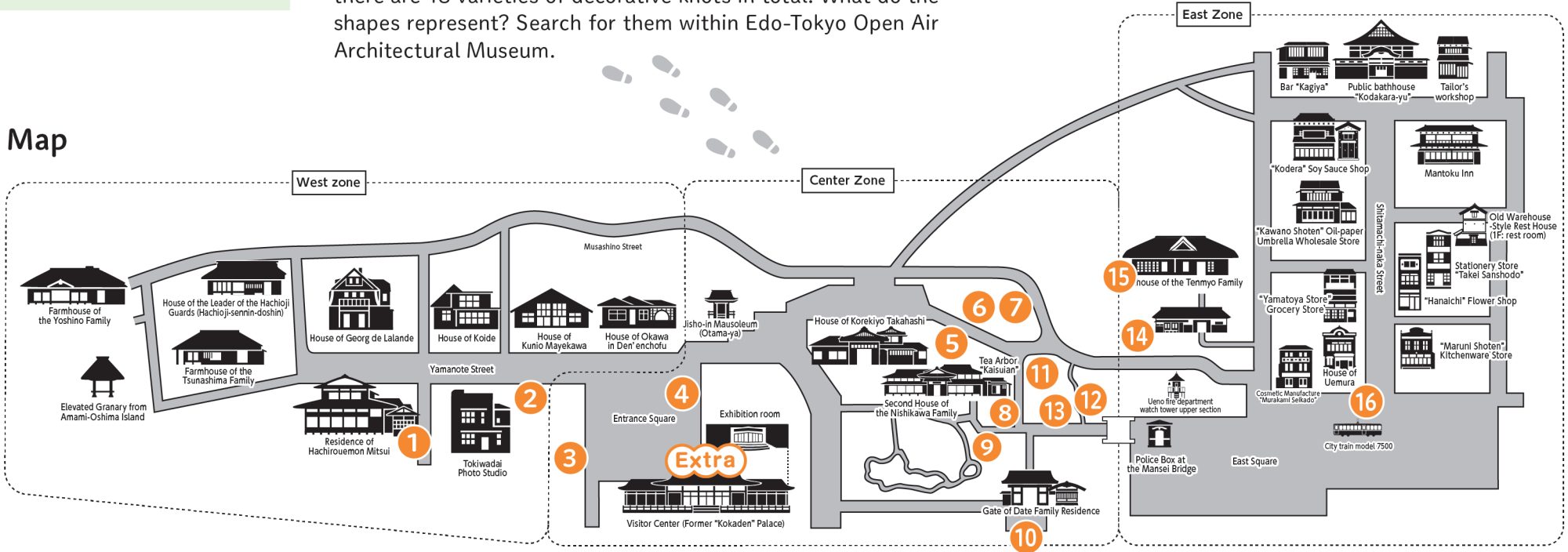
Edo-Tokyo Open Air Architectural Museum's komomaki are "dressed up" with decorative knots. Including the extra one, there are 18 varieties of decorative knots in total. What do the shapes represent? Search for them within Edo-Tokyo Open Air Architectural Museum.



Komomaki (Straw Belts)

Komomaki are not used to protect trees from the cold. During winter, the larvae of harmful insects – known as pine moths – burrow into the komomaki. Then, in early spring, before the larvae become active, the komomaki are removed, and the harmful insects are thus gotten rid of along with them.
